



Dear Friends,

"Are there any solutions to the problems?"
That was the question posed - and partially answered - by Alan Borsuk in a significant article in the Fall 2024 edition of the Marquette Lawyer

magazine. Borsuk is a Milwaukee treasure who has spent decades researching and reporting on the educational landscape in Milwaukee. Borsuk's excellent article is bolstered by responses from six other urban education experts, like Dr. Howard Fuller and Mike Gousha.

For the last year, the St. Marcus team has been doing a deep dive to understand how the best educational minds in Milwaukee and beyond are thinking about addressing the educational crisis in our country. We agree with Albert Einstein, who once said, "If I had an hour to solve a problem, I'd spend 55 minutes thinking about the problem and 5 minutes thinking about solutions." Are you willing and able to join us in thinking more about the problems?

Today, we are in desperate need of thought partners. We need people who have dedicated the time to understand the issues and engage in dialogue and action that will lead to substantive educational change over the next 5, 10, and 20 years.

Therefore, I invite you to read Borsuk's article and the responses and to engage in a dialogue about what's next for St. Marcus and what's next for Milwaukee. To intrigue you, let me share a few points from the articles.

Borsuk has several main conclusions. First, top-down reforms, like the federal law "No Child Left Behind" generally have little impact. Secondly, the main levers for improving educational outcomes are improving the quality and rigor of interactions between students and teachers and addressing barriers to success in school that stem from a student's home life, particularly in the ages of birth to five.

Mike Gousha's powerful piece, "The Problem is Us," claims that any set of school reforms are likely to fail

when society at large is seemingly so unconcerned about the problems and disengaged from working towards solutions. He writes, "Meaningful change in addressing our biggest educational challenges will be hard to accomplish if large numbers of citizens are unmoved by society's educational disparities or are simply uninterested or distracted. We can blame the educrats and politicians all we want, but perhaps the problem is us."

Finally, in his predictably compelling response, "The Body Politic Writ Large Does Not Care," Dr. Howard Fuller shares his fundamental belief that, "Unfortunately, more has not been done and will not be done because there is no real urgency in this country's body politic writ large to seriously attack the problems on both sides of the equation - in school and outside of school." More optimistically, Fuller concludes with the hopeful statement, "We need small groups of dedicated, committed, and relentless people who will refuse to accept the situation now existing."

And that's where you come in! You are a critical part of the "dedicated, committed, and relentless people" who have made St. Marcus School the success story it is today and the catalyst for change throughout our city.

Let me share one example of what "dedicated, committed, and relentless" looks like. The morning of January 21 was bitterly cold. To my knowledge, every school in the city of Milwaukee - and several universities - closed that day. But St. Marcus was open, and over 500 scholars walked through our doors and had an exceptional day of learning. Together, we are relentlessly committed to doing whatever it takes to enable our scholars to achieve remarkable outcomes.

Please continue to partner with us in a ridiculously relentless and dedicated way to fight for St. Marcus kids and every child in our city so that every single one finds safety, hope, and a purpose in their school. Together, we can solve these problems.



St. Marcus life coach, Moe Lawrenz, hosts RISE dinners for St. Marcus parents who have expressed interest in improving their financial situations. The event inspires parents who are beginning their journeys towards financial stability and celebrates those who have made significant financial achievements. The evening features parents who have overcome barriers and achieved their goals by participating in St. Marcus financial literacy classes, engaging in 1-on-1 life coaching sessions, and more. We also partner with several local organizations to enhance the financial empowerment program, including ACTS Housing, Housing Resources Inc., The Equitable Bank, Great Midwest Bank, and Habitat for Humanity.

"It's important to put parents in our community who have achieved financial stability in front of those who are struggling, so they see that they can achieve those goals, too," Moe says. One of the recently featured speakers was Netta, a 28-year-old St. Marcus parent who recently achieved her goal of home ownership through

a partnership with Habitat for Humanity.

This is a phrase Netta constantly returned to during her journey towards home ownership. Netta, along with her two children, went through several stages of housing insecurity, from being homeless to finding temporary housing, to renting.

Through St. Marcus' financial empowerment program, Netta was able to work with Habitat for Humanity to build a brand new home for her and her children! Netta overcame so many financial barriers in order to qualify for habitat housing.

Throughout her journey, she accomplished many feats and was able to raise her credit score, build up her savings, and pay off outstanding debt. In her testimony to fellow RISE attendees, this past December, she said, "God has blessed me and taught me so many foundational lessons that will stay with me on this life journey."

Once Netta completes her sweat equity hours through Habitat for Humanity, her family will be able to move into their home. Congratulations on your huge achievement, Netta!

In this unique program, scholars in 5th-8th grades spend time in the classroom learning about different places, historical events, and cultures in the United States. Scholars visit museums, national and state parks, college campuses, and historical landmarks as they can see up close the materials they've spent so much time learning about from a distance. This program is made possible thanks to support from St. Marcus friends who believe in the importance of hands-on learning experiences.



SCIENCE AT ST. MARCUS

Scholars Lead the Way!

In the past few issues, we've featured the arts at St. Marcus – music, theater, and visual art programs driven by dedicated individuals who believe in the transformational power of the arts.

Now, we're excited to give you a little look into our science program!

To provide a well-rounded science curriculum, St. Marcus partners with an organization called Project Lead the Way (PLTW). This national nonprofit partners with schools to provide STEM programs and real-world, hands-on learning experiences that empower students to gain the skills they need to thrive in high school, college, their career, and beyond.


Our partnership with PLTW has been invaluable. Scholars have learned and refined essential skills that have long-term benefits, like problem-solving, critical and creative thinking, collaboration, and communication.

St. Marcus science teachers use a variety of PLTW curricula, like computer programming, to build a mobile app. Most recently, 7th-8th grade science teacher Geoff Loper utilized a PLTW Design & Modeling Unit, where scholars learned about engineering design processes. The unit culminated in a final project in which scholars collaborated to build an occupational therapy toy.

The class worked together to identify and address the needs of a child with Cerebral Palsy, whose needs were based on specific, yet fictitious, patient data. The toy was designed to help the patient work through the specific physical and developmental issues associated with Cerebral Palsy. Scholars learned how to analyze problems, brainstorm solutions, and work collaboratively on designing and building a prototype, which younger scholars then tested in grades 1-3!

The impacts of real-world, hands-on experiences like this reach beyond the classroom. Mr. Loper says, "Projects like this really help to build a deeper understanding and empathy for those we see who have to live with and work through physical disabilities, but also gives some deeper understanding for the instances where those disabilities are not readily visible."

This project is just one example of how you enable our scholars to learn more and further their academic and personal growth daily. Your support for programs like Project Lead the Way opens doors for our scholars to start making important decisions and thinking about possible careers, educational interests, and more – that will impact them for the rest of their lives.
