

#### **Letter from Superintendent Henry Tyson**

Dear Friends,

Over the past six weeks, I've personally been onboarding every new St. Marcus family. We meet in person or over Zoom. The purpose is to give new families the opportunity to accept their scholar's seat only after they

understand who we are, what we believe, and what we expect. Over 95% of the parents who I have met with have accepted their seats!

I ask parents to consider two questions during the meeting. Almost all parents get the answer wrong and gasp when they hear the answers. Let's see how you do.

- 1. What percentage of a child's life is spent in school between birth and age 18? Most parents guess somewhere between 50% and 80%, but the actual answer is 18%. What does this mean? It means that parents are their child's primary educators and influencers. I then go on to share with parents the importance of the responsibility they have to ensure their children's success in school.
- 2. St. Marcus is a Five Star School that "Significantly Exceeds Expectations" according to the State of Wisconsin. Based on the state Forward Exam, what percentage of St. Marcus scholars can read at grade level? Most parents guess somewhere between 80% and 100% but the actual answer is 20%. WHAT?!? Jaws literally drop. Parents gasp. How is that possible?

The fact that St. Marcus is celebrated by the state as a top-performing school and only has 20% of students reading at grade level reveals a seemingly contradictory truth: St. Marcus IS an exceptional school AND we have an extremely long way to go. The work we are doing together is extremely challenging, especially with the lingering effects of the pandemic.

For that reason, we need ALL HANDS IN and we need All Hands in NOW.

Throughout this issue, you will read what it means to have All Hands In.

But let me share what All Hands In looks and feels like from the last two weeks of school. Here are some highlights:

- Two groups of volunteers, some from the church and community and some from Northwestern Mutual, began demolition work for Phase III and Phase IV of our third campus. Two days of volunteer work saved approximately \$20,000 from the construction budget.
- Volunteers came to help at the school's annual book fair which raises money for the school libraries and puts additional books in students' hands and homes.
- Volunteers from Home Libraries 4 Kids were in the school, meeting with scholars and helping them to match donated books with their interests.
- 50 scholars were baptized and 12 were confirmed as a result of the Holy Spirit working through teachers, mentors, and congregation members.
- For the second year in a row, St. Marcus won the State Lutheran Track and Field Competition, beating schools from all over the state. Our volunteer coaches helped to make this possible.
- We learned that 65 of the 68 members of the class of 2019 graduated from high school and that 58% of them are planning on attending a four-year college. Others are joining the military, attending trade school, working, and one is becoming a firefighter.
- Donors rallied around Discover America, investing over \$150,000 so that over 100 students could travel throughout Wisconsin and as far afield as Arizona, Alabama, and South Dakota.
- We finished the 22-23 school year with a total of seven St. Marcus families becoming first-time homeowners.



We checked in with a few of our graduating leaders to learn about their future plans and reflect on their time at St. Marcus.




### Where are you going to high school?


Marquette University High School

After college and medical school, I aspire to become a neurologist.




## Where are you going to high school? Rufus King High School


### Where are you going to high school? Dominican High School

What is the most important life lesson you learned from St. Marcus that you will carry with you wherever you go?


Don't be afraid to fail because failing is the best way to succeed, and if you ever face a challenge, seek help from others, but always first seek answers from God.

"Long-term investments in our partner schools' students are crucial for our city's future," Thomas adds. "Our pipeline strategy looks at how we can keep a hand on students' shoulders throughout their entire educational journey, even through postsecondary schooling to career introduction. Part of this includes helping highperforming schools like St. Marcus offer more seats through expansion."

And more high-quality seats are exactly what Thomas and his volunteer team will make possible. On their volunteer day, work concentrated on the space that will ultimately become the campus' motor skills room for our youngest scholars.

"It was such a feel-good project!" Thomas recalls. "And what's even more meaningful is the knowledge that our work made an actual, tangible difference.

We all know there's value in volunteerism, but you can't always quantify the impact. Henry Tyson quantified it for us by sharing the actual cost savings of our volunteer work to the overall project."

In fact, the work accomplished by volunteers on May 11 and 13 slashed approximately \$20,000 from the overall project's demolition costs—a sum that can instead fund St. Marcus' critical, core educational needs. Simply put, All Hands In volunteerism directly translates to more seats for St. Marcus scholars.

"We partner with St. Marcus because of its consistent stand-out status as a school that exceeds expectations," Thomas says. "Constant attention to performance and a strong team of educators is part of the 'special sauce' that enables St. Marcus to succeed and expand."


"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Colette started her journey with St. Marcus in 2019 when she enrolled four of her seven children. She was looking for an excellent education for her children but never imagined the community engagement programming at St. Marcus would lead her to build and own her own home.

"I met with Moe (St. Marcus Life Coach) a couple of times early on because of some hardships I was having, but never fully engaged." After Colette saw a news segment about the financial literacy workshops St. Marcus was hosting and Moe's work with other parents, she decided she needed to get further involved.

Colette started meeting with Moe in 2021. They worked together on her finances, created a budget, and got her on the right track financially. "When we started going through my finances, it made me want to change for the better. Moe was very encouraging and told me I could do it! It gave me the courage to want to reach my goals!"

Homeownership was one of those goals. Colette applied with Habitat for Humanity at the encouragement of Moe and got accepted in the spring of 2022. Over the past year, Colette has helped build her home as part of the Habitat program.

"You have to get dirty when working with Habitat. It's a job! You are putting in the time to build your walls and help others build theirs. You start to build relationships with others going through the same things you are."

"It is literally what All Hands In means to me. It's a push. Each one, reach one. Knowing that I had the support of so many, whether it was from another Habitat homeowner, volunteers from churches, or sponsor organizations, there were so many people that were part of building my home. Not everyone has a support system or family members that can help in this way. When others push me and teach me about the positive things around homeownership and building generational wealth, it makes me a better person."

On top of that, Colette worked at Habitat's ReStore as part of the program, volunteering at the resale shop.

"It has been a great experience for me and my kids. My kids were there and watched me build our home. It gave us something to live for. We now take pride in it, which has given my kids a better sense of what "home" really means. I am so grateful to St. Marcus and everyone who has made this dream a reality."

"I admire this woman so much. She managed her full time job, countless volunteer and sweat equity hours with Habitat and being an awesome mom to her kids...She did it for her kids and I'm so proud of her for overcoming all of the obstacles that came her way to make this dream come true. Colette is one of the many St. Marcus parents working hard to achieve their goals. I love that I gained a new friend in Colette. I love my job. I love St. Marcus and everyone who pours into it to change lives."
